

"Why Don't More Society Members Enter Flower Shows?"

This question was posed by Crystal Trojek, a frequent contributor to the GardenOntario Facebook page. Crystal says:

"I often hear this question at local Horticultural Society meetings. Somebody has gone to the trouble of setting up the space, bringing the paperwork, assigning judges, coming up with interesting classes, and keeping records of who wins in a points system for a prize at the end of the year. So why don't more people enter?"

Crystal could well be talking about our Society. Here are some of the reasons we have heard:

- 1. "I don't have time for that."? We realize that everyone has different priorities as to how to spend their 24 hours per day. What if you considered spending one hour per flower show? That would amount to only four hours per year! It would make our shows so much more interesting for all of us.
- 2. "I don't know anything about it." Wouldn't you like to find out more? We have experienced members who are always willing to help you. Our Yearbook and Show Guide is a good source of information. For more thorough information there is the Ontario Judging and Exhibiting (OJES) available at our meetings.
- 3. "My flowers aren't good enough." We suggest you let the judge decide that.

4. "Why bother - I won't win anything." One thing is for sure – you won't win if you don't enter. Yes, being awarded a red ribbon feels great but in our opinion, it's not all about winning – it's all about participation, about being part of what it takes to have an interesting time at our meetings, about learning from other members.

We only have flower shows in May, June, September, and October. Please help us to make those four shows colourful and interesting for all.

Editor's note: I hope I'll be forgiven for expressing these observations. It was the flower show that hooked me at my very first meeting twenty years ago and it has been close to my heart ever since.
